Financial support for 16-24 year olds 2016-17



This support is for 16/17 year old young people in care ('eligible' young people) and 16/17 year olds who were in care sometime after their 16th birthdays but are no longer in care ('relevant' young people) and applies from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017

Accommodation - Where you are living (16-17 years)

If you live with **foster carers** or in a **children's home** they provide your:

- pocket money
- personal and clothing allowance
- travel costs
- Birthday and Christmas (or other festival such as Eid al-Fitr) presents and holiday costs

In **supported lodgings** you get a personal allowance of £38 a week and a **weekly or monthly bus pass**.

All your meals are provided and you don't pay towards household hills

In **Downslink YMCA**, **Foyer**, **Stopover or other young people's hostels**, you get an allowance of £58 a week and a weekly or monthly bus pass. The weekly service charge from the hostel which covers your contribution to utility bills will be deducted from your allowance.

If you go back to live with **your mother or father** before you are 18 we will continue to support you according to your needs. If you live in **supported lodgings, a hostel or flat** you get a 17th birthday allowance of £50 and an 18th birthday allowance of £100. For Christmas you get an allowance of £50 and if you practice another religion this can be paid for your festival such as Eid al-Fitr.

Emergency payments to cover lost or stolen allowances will usually be kept to one payment every six months and these will usually be supermarket vouchers.

Further Education, Training & Employment (16-17 years)

For all further education courses and some training schemes you can claim an Education Bursary from your college or training provider.

Books, equipment, special clothing, field trips, exam fees and internet access that you need for your course are paid. If you don't have access to a computer, one will be provided* for full-time courses where it's needed for completing coursework.



- * A one off computer fund of up to £500 will be provided. This will include software and printer. You can choose to top this up from your own money.
- If you're on a course of more than 16 hours a week and can't get the Education Bursary, we'll pay £30 a week incentive allowance.
- If you're on a course of less than 16 hours and not getting the Education Bursary, we'll pay £20 a week for 10 weeks. After 10 weeks, this can go up to £30 a week depending on how many hours a week you are training.

These incentives are paid on the same attendance conditions as the Education Bursary.

Where a **Traineeship** pays less than **£58** a week you will get a top up to this amount.

We'll pay for interview clothes or special clothes needed fo<u>r work</u>.



If you are on the Under-18 Minimum Wage or on an Apprentice Wage there may be additional support available to encourage you to stay in that job.

Any expenses you have when doing voluntary work will be repaid.

Higher Education (16-17 years)



If you are thinking of a university education please let your Social Worker know and note it in your Pathway Plan so planning can start.

Other Financial Support (16-17 years)

We'll pay for any special costs that will help you follow your religion, culture or race or with your English if this is not your first language.

You'll get a **'Listen Up'** card that gives you to free use of swimming and sports facilities at the Prince Regent, King Alfred, Moulsecoomb, St Luke's and Withdean Centres. If you have to pay for costs like gym induction, these will be repaid. The 'Listen Up' card also entitles you to free admission to the Royal Pavilion and to all Brighton and Hove museums.

You'll be encouraged to complete a Health Assessment every year with our Nurse and for this you'll get a voucher for £10. You'll also get a £10 voucher when you have both your 6 monthly dental checks done in the year.

When agreed with your Social Worker or Personal Adviser, you will be paid for travel or other costs that help regular contact with your family.

Financial support for 18/24 year old young people: 2016/17

Most young people who have been in care get their income from employment, training providers, education grants, Job Seekers Allowance or Income Support and Housing Benefit. However, additional financial support is available as explained in this leaflet.

These amounts of money apply from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017.

When you are "Staying Put" with your foster carers you will pay a service charge of £20 a week. This covers all your meals and your contribution towards household bills.

When you are living in supported housing you will pay a weekly service charge which varies depending on the accommodation. This covers your contribution to utility bills.

If you are over 21 and no longer receiving our support but want to get back into education or training, we may be able to help. This will depend on a full assessment and may be different from the support detailed below.

A separate leaflet "Education & Training Support 21-25 year old Care Leavers" is available which gives more detail.

If you are already on an education or training course as agreed in your **Pathway Plan** then support will be provided as detailed below.

Further Education & Training (18-25 years)

When you are in full-time further education and Income Support stops on your 20th birthday (or at 21 if the course started before you were 19) we'll pay a weekly living allowance of £58 (Income

Support level) from the start of the Autumn Term to end of the Summer Term (including over Christmas and Easter holidays)



Your rent will be paid by Housing Benefit if your Personal Adviser confirms to the Housing Benefit office that your weekly living allowance is at the same level as Income Support.

For further education courses and some training schemes you can claim either **an Education Bursary** or **19+ Learner Funds** from your college. If you're unable to claim either of these and you continue in full-time further education (more than 16 hours a week) we'll pay you £30 a week incentive allowance on the same attendance conditions as the Education Bursary.

If you're on a training course of less than 16 hours a week and can't get the Education Bursary, we'll pay you an incentive allowance of £20 a week for 10 weeks. After 10 weeks, this could go up to £30 a week depending upon the number of training hours a week and will be paid on the same attendance conditions as the Education Bursary.

We will pay for books, equipment, special clothing, field trips, exam fees and internet access that are essential for your course and either a weekly or a monthly bus pass during term time. If you don't have access to a computer, one will be provided* for full-time courses where it is required for completing coursework.



* A one off computer fund of up to £500 will be provided. This will include software and printer. You can choose to top this up from your own money.

Any expenses you have when doing voluntary work will be repaid.

Employment (18-25 years)

If you are on the 18-20 years or 21+ years Minimum Wage or the Apprentice Wage there may be additional support available to encourage you to stay in that job.

We'll pay for interview clothes or special clothes you need for work.



University

You will receive:

- a **Higher Education Bursary** of £670 at start of academic year,
- the **government maintenance grant** of £3387* claimed via online application on www.gov.uk
- **Rent** on your flat, or a shared house or your hall of residence for **52** weeks a year.
- If **'Staying Put'** with former foster carers this arrangement can continue either full-time or weekend stays or for vacations.

Additionally we will pay for all required books, equipment, special clothing, field trips, exam fees, a computer and software (up to £500) and internet access for your course.

Travel costs to and from university at the start, mid and end of term will be paid as well as any removal costs.

You will need to take out a loan from the Student Loan Company to cover payment of the tuition fees. However many universities give a fees discount or cash bursary to young people who are care leavers under the National Scholarship Scheme or Access to Learning Fund. You will be responsible for repaying any loan you take out.

Other Financial Support (18-25 years)

We will pay for any special costs that will help you follow your religion, culture or race or with your English if it is not your first language.

You are entitled to a **Setting Up Allowance** up to a maximum of £2170 to help you set up home. You'll need to agree what you need with your Personal Adviser well before you move and to find out costs of each item so these can be approved. We expect that most furniture and white goods (fridge, cooker, washing machine) will be of good quality from reliable charity shops. This will make your allowance go much further.

The allowance is also available to young people with disabilities who are not able or ready to live independently.

We will pay for any documents you will need including replacement birth certificate, passport and provisional and full driving licences.

We will pay for removal costs and for a TV licence and home contents insurance policy for the first year in your own accommodation.

You can continue to use your 'Listen Up' card at Brighton and Hove Leisure Centres, Royal Pavilion and museums.
